Proposition 40 Passes!

On the March ballot, Proposition 40 – the California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks, and Coastal Protection Act of 2002 – passed. Proposition 40 will provide essential funds to help preserve California ecosystems and habitats and improve our ability to enjoy already-protected areas that are accessible to the public. It will provide \$1,275 billion of bond monies for land conservation and improved air and water quality and \$1,325 billion that will be dedicated to California’s State and local parks, recreation, and historic and cultural resources. Of particular interest to the PV SB Group, the passage of Proposition 40 will provide funds to purchase the Portuguese Bend Preserve on the Palos Verdes Peninsula, a wild place where many of us hike on Thursday evenings and on the PV Sunday Brunch Hike. Thank you all for your individual and collective efforts in getting this important proposition passed. You children and grandchildren will thank you too!

Get Involved!

Let’s not rest on our laurels because of the passage of Proposition 40. True, it has provided badly needed funds to maintain what we already have, but there is still much work to be done. Ballona Creek, Bolsa Chica, and other coastal preserves are still not safe from developers. Loggers are still very actively cutting down old growth in one national forest and clear cutting in another. And yes – right here in Palos Verdes, developers are still hard at work in getting permits to build yet more golf courses on, get this!, our publicly owned open spaces.

Then there is the recently acquired Forrester Reserve which is just north of Ocean Trails Golf Course. It has some of the most pristine plantlife on the entire peninsula. But it needs some help. Volunteers are needed to remove iceplant and sweet fennel that has crept into the lower area of the reserve. Mountain bikers also want access to the area. Make your voice be heard. Come on out and get involved!

Visiting these three outstanding sites was an excellent reminder of what the Club's conservation mission is all about. Do yourself a favor and visit these areas, if not on our next trip there, then privately. But do avoid the really hot months! Now that summer is approaching, and we are on daylight saving time, our conditioning hikes are pretty much all in daylight. They provide an excellent opportunity to prepare for more the rigorous hikes of the summer and to observe the plants and animals of the Palos Verdes peninsula, and to enjoy the open spaces your local Group has worked hard to preserve.

It's been a few months since I've mentioned our goal of building up our base of hike leaders this year. We are making progress, but more is needed. The Club has excellent resources for learning the basics to become an "O" rated leader, and for advancing to higher ratings. There will be another LTP lecture in October and navigation practice/check-off opportunities starting in September and extending into January; for the more ambitious who want to advance to an "M" rating, there are also rock and snow practice/check-off sessions. September and October may seem far off, but please do plan and prepare early.

PVSB Group **Conservation Committee**

The 160 acres that make up the Forrestal Nature Preserve were acquired by the city of Rancho Palos Verdes in 1996. A Management Plan was approved by the City last year. There is now a Forrestal Steering Committee that is made up of representatives from the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy, and local residents. The Steering Committee is working on plans for habitat restoration and trails.

The Quarry Bowl itself is probably the most familiar feature of the Forrestal site. This was the source of basalt for breakwaters around Long Beach Harbor. Forrestal also contains some of the best Coastal Sage Scrub on the peninsula as well as a small area of Southern Cactus Scrub. These are very special plant communities that only occur in coastal areas, and are rapidly being lost to development. The preserve is home to the Palos Verdes Blue Butterfly, the California gnatcatcher, and the Coastal Cactus Wren.

In February the Forrestal Steering Committee sponsored its first Weeding event. A wonderful group of hardworking volunteers turned out and began removing the iceplant and pampas grass that has invaded the site. The Conservancy provided water and fruit for the volunteers and the City provided trashbags, a large dumpster, and wheelbarrows so that we could dispose of the weeds offsite. This is a wonderful opportunity to work together with the City and the Conservancy to accomplish some really important conservation goals. Weeding and Cleanup at Forrestal will be a regular event on the 2nd Sunday of each month from 9 AM until noon.

Please join us for a few hours once a month to help restore this beautiful site! Work gloves, sturdy shoes, and sun protection are recommended. For more information, you may contact Barbara Sattler at 831-0032.

Spotlight on Flowers

Last year in March, I brought my sister out to introduce her to the desert. She doesn't like heat, and had a mental picture of sand dunes, buzzards, and no plants. I wanted to have her first experience be during the desert bloom. Our first week, near Anza-Borrego was hot and, while we enjoyed the scenery, the flowers were a disappointment.

The second week took us to Death Valley. There were patches of color everywhere. Acres of bright yellow snakehead and desert dandelion, punctuated by dots of purple phacelia. Vast carpets of purple mat. It was the week before Easter and the trail to Keane Mine was lined with desert five spot in bloom, looking like pink Easter eggs in the morning. In some areas the dahlia was in bloom, turning the ubiquitous gray desert brush into clusters of brilliant purple.

I love collecting flowers. A lot of desert flowers are not a whole lot larger than a capital O on this page. I would get down on my hands and knees, butt up in the air, pinky finger out to keep the lens three inches from the flower, trying to capture each elusive specimen. I will try again this year. I have learned a few tricks, like a coin next to the flower both helps the camera to focus and indicates just how small this specimen is! I need a better way to organize my photos and figuring out what I have captured is a real challenge, but the search for a new flower or a better shot of an old one adds a whole new dimension to my wanderings.
